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#### 1. Introduction

Resolute was appointed by the applicant, Eskom SOC Limited, to apply for Environmental Authorisation for listed activities in terms of the NEMA 2014 EIA Regulations.

The Directions Regarding Measures to Address, Prevent and Combat the Spread of COVID-19 Relating to National Environmental Management Permits and Licenses, as published in Regulations GN.R 650: on 05 June 2020, aim to curtail the threat posed by the COVID -19 pandemic and to alleviate, contain and minimize the effects of the national state of disaster, and in particular provide directions to ensure fair licensing processes and public participation processes. The directions specify that Public Participation Plan proposals for pending applications must be submitted to the relevant assigned case officer for discussion.

This report contains the Public Participation Plan for the above application for approval by the Competent Authority. The Public Participation Plan was compiled in accordance with the National Environmental Management Act, 1998 (Act no. 107 of 1998) and the following regulations:

- Environmental Impact Assessment Regulations 2014 (as amended) and published on 7 April 2017 in GN.R. 324 327.
- Directions Regarding Measures to Address, Prevent and Combat the Spread of COVID-19
  Relating to National Environmental Management Permits and Licenses, published on 05 June
  2020 in GN.R. 650.

## 2. Status and background of the EIA application

The status of the application is as follow:

- 1. The DEFF reference number for the application: 14/12/16/3/3/2/1138
- 2. The final Scoping Report was accepted by DEFF in a letter dated 17/12/2020.
- 3. Comments on the draft EIAR was received from DEFF in a letter dated 10/06/2020.
- 4. On 13/07/2020 DEFF was notified by the EAP of the extension of time to submit the final EIAR in terms of Section 23(1)(b) of GN. R 326.
- 5. The above application was withdrawn on 30 September 2020. Reasoning for the withdrawal, as recommended by Ms. Thulisile Nyalunga is to submit an amended draft EIAR prior to the final EIAR to give effect and comply with the requirements of regulation 23 (1) (b) of GN. R 326.



#### 3. Way Forward and next steps in the application process

The next steps and the way forward with the application process is as follow:

 Taking into account the status of the existing application, we are of the intension to resubmit the <u>application form</u> and <u>amended draft EIAR</u> after approval of this Public Participation Plan. Subsequently, the measures to be followed ito public participation is outlined in section 4.

### 4. Public Participation Process and Plan

The public participation measures proposed in table 1, were carefully designed to ensure that a fair and reasonable opportunity is provided for public participation in the EIA process, taking into consideration all requirements included in the:
