#### The infrastructure associated with this facility includes:

- a. Install 10MVA 132/33kV transformer at the Bulge Rivier substation
- Construction of ±65km 132kV power line from the authorised Bulger Rivier substation to the new Dorset substation.
- c. Construct an access / construction road for new 132kV line.
- d. Obtain a servitude area of 31 metres wide for the line.

## **Conditions of this Environmental Authorisation**

#### Scope of authorisation

- 1. The preferred route alternative 4 for the Proposed Eskom Bulge-Dosert ±65km 132kv Power line, with a 31m servitude and associated infrastructure as stated above is approved.
- 2. Authorisation of the activity is subject to the conditions contained in this authorisation, which form part of the environmental authorisation and are binding on the holder of the authorisation.
- 3. The holder of the authorisation is responsible for ensuring compliance with the conditions contained in this environmental authorisation. This includes any person acting on the holder's behalf, including but not limited to, an agent, servant, contractor, sub-contractor, employee, consultant or person rendering a service to the holder of the authorisation.
- 4. The activities authorised may only be carried out at the property as described above.
- 5. Any changes to, or deviations from, the project description set out in this authorisation must be approved, in writing, by the Department before such changes or deviations may be effected. In assessing whether to grant such approval or not, the Department may request such information as it deems necessary to evaluate the significance and impacts of such changes or deviations and it may be necessary for the holder of the authorisation to apply for further authorisation in terms of the regulations.
- 6. This activity must commence within a period of three (3) years from the date of issue of this authorisation. If commencement of the activity does not occur within that period, the authorisation lapses and a new application for environmental authorisation must be made in order for the activity to be undertaken.
- 7. Commencement with one activity listed in terms of this authorisation constitutes commencement of all authorised activities.



8. The holder of an environmental authorisation must notify the competent authority of any alienation, transfer and change of ownership rights in the property on which the activity is to take place.

#### Notification of authorisation and right to appeal

- 9. The holder of the authorisation must notify every registered interested and affected party, in writing and within 12 (twelve) calendar days of the date of this environmental authorisation, of the decision to authorise the activity.
- 10. The notification referred to must -
- 10.1. specify the date on which the authorisation was issued;
- 10.2. inform the interested and affected party of the appeal procedure provided for in Chapter 7 of the Environmental Impact Assessment Regulations, 2010;
- 10.3. advise the interested and affected party that a copy of the authorisation will be furnished on request; and
- 10.4. give the reasons of the competent authority for the decision.
- 11. The holder of the authorisation must publish a notice –
- 11.1. informing interested and affected parties of the decision;
- 11.2. informing interested and affected parties where the decision can be accessed; and
- 11.3. drawing the attention of interested and affected parties to the fact that an appeal may be lodged against this decision in the newspaper(s) contemplated and used in terms of regulation 54(2)(c) and (d) and which newspaper was used for the placing of advertisements as part of the public participation process.

#### Management of the activity

12. The Environmental Management Programme (EMPr) submitted as part of the Application for EA is hereby approved. This EMPr must be implemented and adhered to.



#### Monitoring

- 13. The applicant must appoint a suitably experienced independent Environmental Control Officer (ECO) for the construction phase of the development that will have the responsibility to ensure that the mitigation/rehabilitation measures and recommendations referred to in this authorisation are implemented and to ensure compliance with the provisions of the EMPr.
- 13.1. The ECO must be appointed before commencement of any authorised activities.
- 13.2. Once appointed, the name and contact details of the ECO must be submitted to the *Director: Compliance Monitoring* of the Department.
- 13.3. The ECO must keep record of all activities on site, problems identified, transgressions noted and a task schedule of tasks undertaken by the ECO.
- 13.4. The ECO must remain employed until all rehabilitation measures, as required for implementation due to construction damage, are completed and the site is ready for operation.
- 13.5. Records relating to monitoring and auditing must be kept on site and made available for inspection to any relevant and competent authority in respect of this development.

#### Recording and reporting to the Department

- 14. All documentation e.g. audit/monitoring/compliance reports and notifications, required to be submitted to the Department in terms of this authorisation, must be submitted to the *Director: Compliance Monitoring* at the Department.
- 15. The holder of the authorisation must submit an environmental audit report to the Department within 30 days of completion of the construction phase (i.e. within 30 days of site handover) and within 30 days of completion of rehabilitation activities.
- 16. The environmental audit report must indicate the date of the audit, the name of the auditor and the outcome of the audit in terms of compliance with the environmental authorisation conditions as well as the requirements of the EMPr.
- 17. Records relating to monitoring and auditing must be kept on site and made available for inspection to any relevant and competent authority in respect of this development.



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### Commencement of the activity

- 18. The authorised activity shall not commence within twenty (20) days of the date of signature of the authorisation.
- 19. An appeal under section 43 of the National Environmental Management Act (NEMA), Act 107 of 1998 (as amended), does not suspend an environmental authorisation or exemption, or any provisions or conditions attached thereto, or any directive, unless the Minister, MEC or delegated organ of state directs otherwise.
- 20. Should you be notified by the Minister of a suspension of the authorisation pending appeal procedures, you may not commence with the activity until such time that the Minister allows you to commence with such an activity in writing.

#### Notification to authorities

21. Fourteen (14) days written notice must be given to the Department that the activity will commence. Commencement for the purposes of this condition includes site preparation. The notice must include a date on which it is anticipated that the activity will commence, as well as a reference number. This notification period may coincide with the notice of intent to appeal period.

#### Operation of the activity

22. Fourteen (14) days written notice must be given to the Department that the activity operational phase will commence.

#### Site closure and decommissioning

23. Should the activity ever cease or become redundant, the applicant shall undertake the required actions as prescribed by legislation at the time and comply with all relevant legal requirements administered by any relevant and competent authority at that time.

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#### Specific conditions

- 24. No activities will be allowed to encroach into a water resource without a water use authorisation being in place from the Department of Water Affairs.
- 25. The applicant must obtain a wayleave from the Department of Public Transport Roads and Works prior construction.
- 26. The span that crosses drainage lines and old lands should be marked with bird Flight Diverters on the earth wire of the line, five metres apart, alternating black and white.
- 27. Poles must be fitted with bird perches on top of the poles to draw birds, particularly vultures, away from the potentially risky insulators.
- 28. A botanist must be appointed to perform a final walkthrough of the alignment to identify sensitive plant species, guide final pegging of pole positions and assist in identifying the areas that require protection.
- 29. A permit must be obtained from the relevant nature conservation agency for the removal or destruction of indigenous protected and endangered plant and animal species.
- 30. Copies of permits all permits required must be submitted to the Department for record keeping before commencement of construction activities.
- 31. No exotic plants may be used for rehabilitation purposes. Only indigenous plants of the area may be utilised.
- 32. The applicant is required to inform the Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries and this Department should the removal of protected species, medicinal plants and "data deficient" plant species be required. The NFA protected trees need to be individually GPS'd and permits acquired for their removal.
- 33. Indigenous vegetation that does not interfere with the safe operation of the structure (132kV power line) must be left in place. Clearing of vegetation for tower position must be the minimum require for the specific tower.
- 34. No ablution facilities must be placed within 200m of any drainage lines, banks of any river, wetland or streams.
- 35. Site specific landowner issues (with regards to alignment) must be discussed and finalised with the affected landowners before commencement of construction activities.
- 36. No chemical control (herbicides) must be used to control alien plants or indigenous plants, only the use of mechanical methods will be permitted.



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- 37. Pylons must be placed outside 1:100 year floodline when crossing the river and pylons musty be places 50m from sensitive areas.
- 38. Positioning of the foundation slabs for the pylons must be a minimum of 10m away from the edge of all drainage lines.
- 39. A small grove of Camel Thorns on both sides (24° 06.822'S; 27° 48.301'E) of the D1882 sand road in the vicinity of the Moloko River is a 'No-Go Zone'. The route must avoid the groves.
- 40. No temporary or other construction facilities must be erected or stored within 200m the banks of the Moloko River or the Poers se Loop stream.
- 41. Under no circumstances must be pylons be placed directly in the river bed, wetlands or drainage lines.
- 42. Vegetation clearing must be kept to an absolute minimum. Mitigation measures must be implemented to reduce the risk of erosion and the invasion of alien species.
- 43. Construction must include appropriate design measures that allow surface and subsurface movement of water along drainage lines so as not to impede natural surface and subsurface flows.

  Drainage measures must promote the dissipation of storm water run-off.
- 44. An integrated waste management approach must be implemented that is based on waste minimisation and must incorporate reduction, recycling, re-use and disposal where appropriate. Any solid waste shall be disposed of at a landfill licensed in terms of section 20 (b) of the National Environment Management Waste Act, 2008 (Act 59 of 2008).

#### General

- 45. A copy of this authorisation and the approved EMPr must be kept at the property where the activity/ will be undertaken. The authorisation and approved EMPr must be produced to any authorised official of the Department who requests to see it and must be made available for inspection by any employee or agent of the holder of the authorisation who works or undertakes work at the property.
- 46. The holder of the authorisation must notify both the *Director: Integrated Environmental Authorisations* and the *Director: Compliance Monitoring* at the Department, in writing and within 48 (forty eight) hours, if any condition of this authorisation cannot be or is not adhered to. Any notification in terms of this condition must be accompanied by reasons for the non-compliance.
- 47. National government, provincial government, local authorities or committees appointed in terms of the conditions of this authorisation or any other public authority shall not be held responsible for any damages or losses suffered by the applicant or his successor in title in any instance where



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construction or operation subsequent to construction be temporarily or permanently stopped for reasons of non-compliance by the applicant with the conditions of authorisation as set out in this document or any other subsequent document emanating from these conditions of authorisation.

## **Annexure 1: Reasons for Decision**

## 1. Information considered in making the decision

In reaching its decision, the Department took, inter alia, the following into consideration -

- The information contained in the BAR dated August 2012;
- b) The comments received from the DEA Biodiversity Management, DEA Protected Areas and Development Planning, Eskom: Rural Development and Land Reform and Department of Transport, Department of Forestry and Fisheries and interested and affected parties as included in the BAR dated August 2012;
- Mitigation measures as proposed in the BAR dated August 2012 and the EMPr;
- d) The information contained in the specialist studies contained within Appendix D of the BAR; and
- e) The objectives and requirements of relevant legislation, policies and guidelines, including section 2 of the National Environmental Management Act, 1998 (Act 107 of 1998).

### 2. Key factors considered in making the decision

All information presented to the Department was taken into account in the Department's consideration of the application. A summary of the issues which, in the Department's view, were of the most significance is set out below.

- a) The findings of all the specialist studies conducted and their recommended mitigation measures.
- b) This application is part of a broader scope of works to improve the network performance. Currently the network is experiencing under voltage and is incapable of handling additional loads due to the contingency constraints of the network.
- c) The BAR dated August 2012 identified all legislation and guidelines that have been considered in the preparation of the BAR dated August 2012.
- d) The Bulge Rivier substation and the new Dosert substation have already been authorised and the new Dosert Substation is already under construction. These substation, together with the proposed distribution line are part of the master plan to curb outages in the area



- e) In terms of the specialist findings of the report dated July 2012 compiled by Flori Horticulture Services cc Alternative Route 4 is the ecologically recommended alternative.
- f) The methodology used in assessing the potential impacts identified in the BAR dated August 2012 and the specialist studies have been adequately indicated.
- g) A sufficient public participation process was undertaken and the applicant has satisfied the minimum requirements as prescribed in the EIA Regulations, 2010 for public involvement.

#### 3. Findings

After consideration of the information and factors listed above, the Department made the following findings -

- a) The identification and assessment of impacts are detailed in the BAR dated August 2012 and sufficient assessment of the key identified issues and impacts have been completed.
- b) Taking the zoning of the Waterberg Biosphere Reserve into consideration, the Eskom power line route was designed to limit the impact on the Waterberg Biosphere Reserve.
- c) The majority of the proposed project falls within the transition Zone 2 where infrastructure could be allowed. Approximately 50% of the proposed power line runs on the border of the Transitional Zone of the Waterberg Biosphere Reserve.
- d) According to the report the study area is said to fall within both highly and moderately transformed areas. Most of the study area falls within an area of low conservation priority, but the Moloko dam area to the north and west of the study area falls within an area of very high conservation priority. The Moloko Dam will not be impacted by the proposed development.
- e) The procedure followed for impact assessment is adequate for the decision-making process.
- f) The proposed mitigation of impacts identified and assessed adequately curtails the identified impacts.
- g) The information contained in the BAR dated August 2012 is accurate and credible.
- h) EMPr measures for the pre-construction, construction and rehabilitation phases of the development were proposed and included in the BAR and will be implemented to manage the identified environmental impacts during the construction process.



In view of the above, the Department is satisfied that, subject to compliance with the conditions contained in the environmental authorisation, the proposed activity will not conflict with the general objectives of integrated environmental management laid down in Chapter 5 of the National Environmental Management Act, 1998 and that any potentially detrimental environmental impacts resulting from the proposed activity can be mitigated to acceptable levels. The application is accordingly granted.
