ENVIRONMENTAL AUTHORISATION IN TERMS OF THE NATIONAL ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT ACT, 1998: GN R. 543, 544 AND 546: FOR THE PROPOSED CONSTRUCTION OF THE STEVE BIKO 132kV SUBSTATION AND ASSOCIATED LOOP IN AND LOOP OUT LINES WITHIN CITY OF TSHWANE METROPOLITAN MUNICIPALITY IN GAUTENG PROVINCE.

for the proposed construction of the Steve Biko 132kV and associated loop in and loop out lines within City of Tshwane Metropolitan Municipality in the Gauteng Province, hereafter referred to as "the property".

The proposed project consists of the following:

- There will be two (2) 132kV lines that will Loop-In and Loop-Out of the proposed substation. The proposed loop-in and loop-out lines will have a servitude width of 52m each (a 21m separation distance between the 2 lines is required, and a 15.5m tree and building restriction is also required).
- The lines will be supported by steel guyed monopole structures.
- These monopoles vary in height between 18.2 to 24.2m and can span between 350 to 455m, meaning that the monopoles will be between 350 to 455m apart, depending on the gradient of the site and the number of turning points required.
- However, for the purposes of this project, the Eskom Engineer confirmed that spans of 250m may be used. As mentioned previously, a 55m way leave area will be required for the outgoing 22kV [medium voltage (MV)] lines which will be exiting the proposed new substation on the north western side of the substation.
- A total of four (4) 22kV lines will existing the substation.
- Each MV line requires a 22m wide servitude, so 11m on either side of the lines. These lines will cross the unnamed road bordering the site to the North West.

Conditions of this Environmental Authorisation

Scope of authorisation

- The preferred Site Alternative one (1), for the construction of the Steve Biko 132kV and associated loop in 1. and loop out lines within City of Tshwane Metropolitan Municipality in the Gauteng Province, with the above coordinates is approved.
- Authorisation of the activity is subject to the conditions contained in this authorisation, which form part of the environmental authorisation and are binding on the holder of the authorisation.
- The holder of the authorisation is responsible for ensuring compliance with the conditions contained in this environmental authorisation. This includes any person acting on the holder's behalf, including but not limited to, an agent, servant, contractor, sub-contractor, employee, consultant or person rendering a service to the holder of the authorisation.
- The activities authorised may only be carried out at the property as described above. 4.
- Any changes to, or deviations from, the project description set out in this authorisation must be approved 5. in writing by the Department before such changes or deviations may be effected. In assessing whether to grant such approval or not, the Department may request such information as it deems necessary to evaluate the significance and impacts of such changes or deviations and it may be necessary for the holder of the authorisation to apply for further authorisation in terms of the regulations.
- This activity/ies must commence within a period of five (5) years from the date of issue of this authorisation. If commencement of the activity/ies does not occur within that period, the authorisation lapses and a new application for environmental authorisation must be made in order for the activity/ies to be undertaken.
- If the applicant anticipates that commencement of the activities would not occur within five (5) year period, he/she must apply and show good cause for an extension of the Environmental Authorisation three (3) months prior to its expiry date.
- Commencement with one activity listed in terms of this authorisation constitutes commencement of all authorised activities.
- The holder of an environmental authorisation must notify the competent authority of any alienation, 9. transfer and change of ownership rights in the property on which the activity/ies is to take place.

Notification of authorisation and right to appeal

- 10. The holder of the authorisation must notify every registered interested and affected party, in writing and within 12 (twelve) calendar days of the date of this environmental authorisation, of the decision to authorise the activity/ies.
- 11. The notification referred to must
 - inform the interested and affected party of the appeal procedure provided for in Chapter 7 of the Environmental Impact Assessment Regulations, 2010;
 - specify the date on which the authorisation was issued 11.2.
 - advise the interested and affected party that a copy of the authorisation will be furnished on 11.3. request; and
 - give the reasons of the competent authority for the decision. 11.4.
- 12. The holder of the authorisation must publish a notice
 - informing interested and affected parties of the decision; 12.1.
 - informing interested and affected parties where the decision can be accessed; and 12.2.
 - drawing the attention of interested and affected parties to the fact that an appeal may be lodged 12.3. against this decision in the newspaper(s) contemplated and used in terms of regulation 54(2) (c) and (d) and which newspaper was used for the placing of advertisements as part of the public participation process.

Management of the activity

13. The Environmental Management Programme (EMPr) submitted as part of the Application for EA is hereby approved. This EMPr must be implemented and adhered to.

Monitoring

- 14. The applicant must appoint a suitably experienced independent Environmental Control Officer (ECO) for the construction phase of the development that will have the responsibility to ensure that the mitigation/rehabilitation measures and recommendations referred to in this authorisation are implemented and to ensure compliance with the provisions of the EMPr.
 - The ECO must be appointed before commencement of any authorised activity/ies.

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- Once appointed, the name and contact details of the ECO must be submitted to the Director: 14.2. Compliance Monitoring of the Department.
- The ECO must meet with the contractors to discuss the conditions of the EA and the contents of 14.3. the EMPr prior to any site clearing occurring.
- The ECO must keep record of all activities on site, problems identified, transgressions noted and 14.4. a task schedule of tasks undertaken by the ECO.
- The ECO must remain employed until all rehabilitation measures, as required for implementation 14.5. due to construction damage, are completed and the site is ready for operation.

Recording and reporting to the Department

- 15. All documentation e.g. audit/monitoring/compliance reports and notifications, required to be submitted to the Department in terms of this authorisation, must be submitted to the Director: Compliance Monitoring at the Department.
- 16. The holder of the authorisation must submit an environmental audit report to the Department within 30 days of completion of the construction phase (i.e. within 30 days of site handover) and within 30 days of completion of rehabilitation activities.
- 17. The environmental audit report must indicate the date of the audit, the name of the auditor and the outcome of the audit in terms of compliance with the environmental authorisation conditions as well as the requirements of the EMPr.
- 18. Records relating to monitoring and auditing must be kept on site and made available for inspection to any relevant and competent authority in respect of this development

Commencement of the activity

- 19. The authorised activity shall not commence within twenty (20) days of the date of signature of the authorisation.
- 20. In terms of section 43(7), an appeal under section 43 of the National Environmental Management Act, 1998 will suspend the environmental authorisation or any provision or condition attached thereto. In the instance where an appeal is lodged you may not commence with the activity/ies until such time that the appeal has been finalised.

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Notification to authorities

21. Fourteen (14) days written notice must be given to the Department that the activity/ies will commence. Commencement for the purposes of this condition includes site preparation. The notice must include a date on which it is anticipated that the activity/ies will commence, as well as a reference number. This notification period may coincide with the notice of intent to appeal period.

Operation of the activity

22. Fourteen (14) days written notice must be given to the Department that the activity/ies operational phase will commence.

Site closure and decommissioning

23. Should the activity/ies ever cease or become redundant, the applicant shall undertake the required actions as prescribed by legislation at the time and comply with all relevant legal requirements administered by any relevant and competent authority at that time

Specific conditions

- 24. Vegetation clearing must be kept to the development footprint.
- 25. Vegetation must be removed in a manner that allows the roots of bushes and shrubs to remain in the ground as far as possible so that there is a chance of re-growth to reduce the risk of erosion.
- 26. All cleared indigenous vegetation must be used to make mulch during the rehabilitation process. Rehabilitation of soil around pylons must take place as soon as possible after construction has ceased.
- 27. All construction material, equipment and any other foreign objects brought into the area by contractors and staff must be removed immediately after construction.
- 28. Eskom must ensure that all waste control and the location of fuel storage areas, hazardous materials (oils, chemicals, and cement), waste storage areas, ablution and latrines and any other potentially polluting activities are in bunded areas and are 100m away from river or stream to avoid any pollution.
- 29. An integrated waste management approach must be implemented that is based on waste minimisation and must incorporate reduction, recycling, re-use and disposal where appropriately. Any solid waste must

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be disposed of at a landfill licensed in terms of section 20 (b) of the National Environment Management

Waste Act, 2008 (Act 59 of 2008).

General

30. A copy of this authorisation and the approved EMPr must be kept at the property where the activity/ will

be undertaken. The authorisation and approved EMPr must be produced to any authorised official of the

Department who requests to see it and must be made available for inspection by any employee or agent

of the holder of the authorisation who works or undertakes work at the property.

31. The holder of the authorisation must notify both the Director: Integrated Environmental Authorisations and

the Director: Compliance Monitoring at the Department, in writing and within 48 (forty eight) hours, if any

condition of this authorisation cannot be or is not adhered to. Any notification in terms of this condition

must be accompanied by reasons for the non-compliance.

32. National government, provincial government, local authorities or committees appointed in terms of the

conditions of this authorisation or any other public authority shall not be held responsible for any

damages or losses suffered by the applicant or his successor in title in any instance where construction

or operation subsequent to construction be temporarily or permanently stopped for reasons of non-

compliance by the applicant with the conditions of authorisation as set out in this document or any other

subsequent document emanating from these conditions of authorisation

Annexure 1: Reasons for Decision

Information considered in making the decision 1.

In reaching its decision, the Department took, inter alia, the following into consideration -

- The information contained in the final BAR dated September 2015 and received by the Department on a. 18 September 2015;
- The public participation process undertaken as per the requirements of regulation 54 of the EIA b. Regulations, 2010;
- Mitigation measures as proposed in the final BAR dated September 2015, received by the Department C. on 18 September 2015 and the EMPr;
- The information contained in the specialist study contained within Appendix D of the final BAR dated d. September 2015 and received by the Department on 18 September 2015;
- The objectives and requirements of relevant legislation, policies and guidelines, including section 2 of e. the National Environmental Management Act, 1998 (Act 107 of 1998).

Key factors considered in making the decision 2.

All information presented to the Department was taken into account in the Department's consideration of the application. A summary of the issues which, in the Department's view, were of the most significance is set out below.

- The findings of all the specialist studies conducted and their recommended mitigation measures. a.
- The need for the proposed project which is to strengthen the bulk supply network in areas. b.
- The Final BAR dated September 2015 received by the Department on 18 September 2015 identified all C. legislations and guidelines that have been considered in the preparation of the BAR.
- The methodology used in assessing the identified potential impacts have been adequately indicated. d.
- A sufficient public participation process was undertaken and the applicant has satisfied the minimum e. requirements as prescribed in the EIA Regulations, 2010 for public involvement.

Findings 3.

After consideration of the information and factors listed above, the Department made the following findings -

- The procedure followed for impact assessment is adequate for the decision-making process. a.
- The proposed mitigation of impacts identified and assessed adequately curtails the identified impacts. b.
- Mitigation measures that will be implemented to manage the identified environmental impacts during the C. pre-construction, construction and rehabilitation phases of the proposed development are included in the EMPr which is submitted as part of the BAR dated September 2015 and received by the Department on 18 September 2015.

In view of the above, the Department is satisfied that, subject to compliance with the conditions contained in the environmental authorisation, the proposed activity will not conflict with the general objectives of integrated environmental management laid down in Chapter 5 of the National Environmental Management Act, 1998 and that any potentially detrimental environmental impacts resulting from the proposed activity can be mitigated to acceptable levels. The environmental authorisation is accordingly granted.
